



Our thriving retail art program is a hub of creativity, skill development and purpose for a diverse mix of over 30 people each week.

Colours and techniques abound as the group dyes and paints fabrics, weaves, makes jewellery, paper maché and textiles. Wind chimes are even being created as old cutlery is given a new lease on life.

Paper craft and machine sewing techniques feature in products including stationery, heat bags and woven items. Cheerful, hand-sewn flowers brighten hair accessories and carry bags.

The group is growing in popularity with participants designing new products, developing skills and enjoying an industrious, social vibe. Group members have a range of vocational and support requirements.

Participants can engage with activities that best suit them and move freely between tasks each session. Group members are becoming increasingly engaged in setting up equipment independently and supporting each other as their skills grow.

Excitingly, the group now has the opportunity to engage with the community: our local Bay Street Coles has generously invited the group to set up a monthly market stall selling its vibrant creations.

- Your NDIS plan is approved (your DHHS funding will cease on that date).

Please remember:

- NDIS Transport Funding replaces the Mobility Allowance effective from your NDIS plan start date. Bayley House will not be accessing transport funding directly from the NDIS. You will still be invoiced for this service.
- Once your NDIS plan has been approved, it is important that you meet with us to finalise your Funding & Service Agreement as a requirement under the NDIS. You will need your plan dates and plan number.
- If you are using a Support Coordinator or Plan Manager, please provide these details to us for inclusion in your Funding & Service Agreement.

Celebrating Charidy campaign success

Bayley House ran its second annual online fundraising campaign day on Tuesday 29 May with a target of \$150,000 in 24 hours.

This seemingly ambitious target was shattered when we raised an astounding \$191,048! The 24-hour campaign was all or nothing: if our target was not reached, we wouldn't receive any funds.

There was great buzz and atmosphere around Bayley House as everyone monitored the 'making lives extraordinary' Charidy webpage as the tally grew to achieve our target just two hours after launch.

The campaign featured clients Courtney, Georgina, James, Katherine, Kurt, Sam and Zoe and its success reflects the high regard the community has for the work of Bayley House.

We welcomed an impromptu visit from Dave Hughes, radio and TV celebrity, who posted a video snippet with James and Katherine which gained nearly 5,000 views.

Extensive marketing via social media and email played a crucial role in our Charidy success. Our Facebook views, likes, comments and shares are now up by 263%. Digital marketing raised awareness far and wide and the campaign kicked off strongly as people started donating immediately. Thank you to our social media ambassadors and everyone else who spread the word.

Such an outstanding result could not have been achieved without the support of many people. On the day, 25 volunteers (including many family members) helped out, with some doing double telethon session shifts! They made over 800 calls and motivated 323 people to donate.

Eye gaze technology

Bayley House is excited to trial sophisticated computer interface technology with the help of a generous grant from Sandringham Community Bank.

The innovative project uses the Eye Mobile Mini system to facilitate interactive communication for people with limited physical movement and speech. The assistive technology allows individuals with highlevel support needs to access and control a computer using their eye movements.

Now clients can navigate apps, the internet, music, e-books, social media, games and more through the natural movement of their eyes. It can be used completely hands-free via a tablet with a touch screen interface.

Project participants and staff are all excited by the opportunities the new technology offers, including access to communication, recreation and mental stimulation. The project aims to improve the self-esteem and independence of participants, who also have the opportunity to train with an experienced speech therapist.

Sandringham Community Bank has been a proud supporter of Bayley House over the past 10 years with grants of over \$37,000 in support of initiatives assisting people with a disability in Bayside.



Going orange for Prader-Willi awareness

IRONMAN OUR HERO

For many, the Queen's Birthday holiday weekend is a time to relax. But not for IronMan Paul Carr, North Brighton Anglican Minister and 'everydayhero'.

Paul joined over 2,500 entrants in the Cairns Asia Pacific IronMan Championships: reputedly the toughest one-day race in the world.

The challenge took in the tropical Queensland coast from Palm Cove to Cairns with a 3.8km open water swim, a 180km bike time trial and a 42.5km run. Paul completed the race without a break in just 10 hours and 33 minutes to finish 184th overall and raised funds for Bayley House in the process.

Paul has participated in IronMan events for the past five years and this remarkable effort now sees him ranked in the top 10 per cent of the 'All World Athlete' banding.

Reflecting on his achievements, Paul says it's not about him. "We managed to raise funds two years ago for a family with difficulties... It was a very special privilege to raise funds for Bayley House. Bayley House and our St Stephen's Church, Gardenvale, have developed a great relationship together."

Paul promoted his race to family, friends and the community via the everydayhero platform and nominated Bayley House as the beneficiary of his fundraising. Thank you to everyone who generously supported Paul to raise almost \$1,000 for Bayley House: a fabulous result!
